Tips for Parents

- Get started on your services as soon as possible, and don't just attend, but truly engage in them
- Come to court with good hygiene and in appropriate clothing
- Keep a log of all appointments, visits, and accomplishments
- Stay in touch with your stakeholders regularly
- Keep all appointments and classes in a calendar to help remember your schedule
- Avoid posting on social media during an open case, and do not post about your case at all
- Bring everything your child(ren) could need to your family time visits, such as snacks, diapers, and activities
- If needing to reschedule an appointment or visit, call at least 24 hours ahead
- Build a healthy support system, including utilizing P4P support
- Remember that the only things you can control are your actions, so focus on that
